KLMHOA Meeting 11-10-11

President Joe Beatty called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. The Pledge of of Allegiance was recited.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Beginning balance: \$524.47 Newsletter ads income: \$125.00 Donation: \$10.00 Newsletter expense: \$149.34) BALANCE \$ 510.13

HOUSEKEEPING CONCERNS:

Minutes from 10-13-11 meeting were read, corrected or amended as indicated below, and approved.

Under Old Business, Item 8.a. "9 spaces" was corrected to read "6 spaces" and "Space 154" was added to indicate the location of the additional parking spaces. Also, under Item 8.c. the park managers indicated that they may change speed bumps in the future to help with the issue of speeding vehicles.

Under Old Business, Item 9.b. park managers clarified that for safety reasons, the park has a limit of two (2) residents per bedroom plus one (1), and reserves the right to determine whether or not a home has adequate living space to accommodate the number of residents expecting to live in a home here.

The KLMHOA Minutes Notebook has been added to the library and contains: A list of current Board Members with their phone numbers; the minutes from previous meetings; the agenda for the next meeting; a copy of the Modified Rules of Order for KLMHOA Meetings; a copy of the park's current rules, and in the future, a copy of the KLMHOA By-laws.

Park managers received a couple of complaints about the September meeting minutes – couple of members present at that meeting stated they were misquoted. The managers suggested that names not be included in the minutes in the future. Discussion included the following:

The Secretary, Wendy, indicated that she had not "quoted" anyone but had recorded a summary of comments or topics introduced by various members. She regrets that anyone believed they were misquoted and is willing to make any corrections that need to be made. These can be reported to her or the President in writing, or presented directly at the next meeting of the KLMHOA.

Members present at today's meeting thought it was useful to record the names of those who introduce a topic or make a motion for the purpose of follow up, but agreed that if someone felt uncomfortable with their name being published in the minutes, they should be able to make this known so their name could **NEXT**

be left out of the published document.

MOTION: The name of any member who raises a topic or comments on an issue may be published in the minutes UNLESS that member specifically requests their name not be included in the minutes. VOTE: motion carried. No one at this meeting asked that his or her name be withheld.

COMMITTEE REPORT: Emergency Preparedness - Chair, Cheryl Clark. Cheryl has obtained a block captain form whose purpose is to identify residents who may need assistance or a check-in during an emergency or disaster similar to the power outage in September.

Joleen was asked to publish a request for volunteers to be block cap-tains in the December and January news-

letters and indicate that final selections will be made at the January KLMHOA meeting.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED: If you are interested, please contact Cheryl Clark or a Board Member. Once the block captain has obtained the information on residents in his or her "block," Cheryl will create a spreadsheet with names, space numbers, and phone numbers. All other information obtained will be available only to the Committee Chair, the block captains, and the current board members.

OLD BUSINESS:

RUMMAGE SALE DISCUSSION: Ellen suggested that a rummage sale could be set up without the need of a committee. Items to be determined include: Date and time of sale: members expressed concerns about possibility of rain in February and are considering a March date.

Someone needs to inform park managers in time to publicize event. Someone needs to create, copy, and distribute a park flyer in time for people to prepare their items for sale, and/or attend the event. Those who want to sell items need to let the park managers know if they want to borrow a clubhouse table or set up their own table.

Since there was no agreement on who would do what at this meeting, Wendy suggested that this be the main item to be discussed at the January meeting.

Newsletter ads for homeowners: current policy remains in effect. Homeowners can place a free "ad" for any free item they want to advertise. If a homeowner wants to sell something, the cost for an ad is the same as for any business advertiser, which is posted in the Newsletter. Ellen also reminded everyone that there are a couple of bulletin boards in the park where homeowners can post notices.

Pool concerns: Debris reported at last month's meeting was cleaned the next day. Belief of most members present today was that this was an isolated incident. No one expressed a desire to continue pursuing extended evening hours.

Recreation room in the middle of park: Ellen reported the following – The Rec Room is locked because of a history of vandalism. The only keys given out in the past were for a pool club that is no longer in existence. There are no plans to initiate use of keys because of concerns that there would be no accountability for losing the key or knowing who has used the key and left the room in poor condition. The current procedure for using the Rec Room: Sign up for use of the room at the front office/ Read and sign agreement and leave a \$50 deposit (cash, check); can leave a deposit "on file" if you want to use frequently. Get key from front office or from Mary Jo if office is closed (probably need to make prior arrangement for this). Use the room and clean up after use. Return key to get deposit returned. Unresolved issue centered on the limited hours of the front office, which decreases availability for spontaneous use of the Rec Room. However, no one at this meeting had experienced a problem with this.

Speeding continues to be a park problem. Suggestion was made to write the license number of any speeding vehicles and report it to the park managers. Suggestion was also made to consider installing "troughs" instead of "bumps" to slow people down, as most vehicles seem to slow more for a dip than for the current bumps. No motion was made.

NEW BUSINESS:

Joleen was thanked for publishing the KLM Newsletter. Ellen was thanked for bringing refreshments.

Question was asked regarding how to increase participation in the KLMHOA meetings. No motions or sugges-

tions were made to increase participation.

Clarification was provided for new members that because homeowners lease/rent and do <u>not</u> own their mobile home spaces, the KLMHOA does not have the power of a governing HOA found in condominium communities. This is also the reason that there is no accounting provided to homeowners for how our space rent is spent.

Draft of proposed KLMHOA By-Laws will be brought to the next meeting. Question was asked regarding whether the park would host another "Dumpster Day." One member thought there might be a dumpster located in the park that could be used any time. The President, Joe, will follow up on this with the park managers.

Question was asked regarding whether park managers were ever invited to these meetings. Answer – not recently, though it has been done in the past.

Motion was made and seconded to end the meeting at 8:00 PM.

3 - D ORNAMENTS

MATERIALS: Paper - white or different colors
Old Christmas cards could be used

Scissors Glue Thread or fine Ribbon Decorations such as glitter or sequins (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS: Fold the piece in half. On one side of the fold draw half of your chosen shape Santa, Bell, etc. - any symmetrical object.) Trace the pattern onto the other half of the paper keeping the design is perfectly symmetrical (or cut along the first line while the paper is still folded.)

Repeat this process so that you have at least three (3) identical shapes. Color or decorate the design. Glue the shapes back to back. Attach thread or ribbon at top of ornament for hanging.
