After a 1968 graduation, Jeanette commenced her 30-year teaching career, mostly in San Diego County having taught at Mt. Empire Jr.-Sr. High in Campo, then Poway Unified School District, primarily 7th grade Life Science. During those teaching years, Ms. Coyle was the first female naturalist in the California State Park system; wrote and published a field guide to the common plants of Baja California; and began her summers of world travel.

Her second husband, a Vietnam Vet, James Conacher, was a career soldier, seeing 21 years of active duty as a Special Forces paratrooper. When he retired again, from work at the local VA Medical Center, in 2002, they moved to Cortez, Colorado for 15 years to be rancher/farmers, raising cattle and the alfalfa to feed them. When Jim passed in early 2019, Jeanette returned to her beloved San Diego renewing friendships with other retired teachers and her congregational family.

Jeanette's favorite lifetime memories include travel to the Galapagos Islands on the equator and many exploratory trips to Israel. She has lived in this peaceful Kearney Lodge MHP nine months now, enjoying her new modular home, tiny garden, and friendly neighbors. Interests and hobbies include Bible study, world travel, scrap booking, quilting, gardening, and serving others in the Name of Yeshua!

THE VERSATILITY OF "TELE" In the Age of COVID-19

Tele- is a versatile prefix that generally refers to covering distances. It is most often seen in the words *telephone* or *television*, which carry sound or images over long distances, but has been adapted to new ways in which interactions are being mediated over distance, such as *telemedicine*, *teleconference*, and *teletown-hall*, which are all remote in practice.

It is the *Telegraph* for sending *telegrams*, besides other "far-off' communications. Many other uses include; *telemarketer*; *telecom-mute*; *teleconference*; *telehealth*; and *telemedicine*.

- "Nantucket also uses tele-radiology, having Boston radiologists, some specializing in certain body areas, read X-rays and scans. It has used tele-pediatrics twice, for a child in a car accident and one in diabetic crisis."

In the age of COVID-19, we are seeing the combining form "<u>tele-</u> used in even more new and creative ways as technologies such as Zoom and Skype allow parties to communicate while remaining distanced: "tele-town halls" or "tele-rallies:, a public "tele-hearing" and "tele-chaplaincy".

As videoconferencing finds its way into other industries, *tele-* might see even more inventive use in the future.

Whether you are enjoying your golden years, know an older adult, or are caring for a loved one, a few preventative measures can make a big difference.

5 TIPS TO STAY PROTECTED

- Shred receipts, bank statements, and unused credit cards before throwing them away.
- 2. Lock up your checkbook, account statements, and sensitive information when you have visitors.
- Never provide your Social Security Number, account numbers, or other financial information over the phone unless you initiated the call and the other party is trusted.
- 4. Assign a trustworthy person to act as your agent in real estate matters.
- Check references and credentials before hiring anyone to help with chores in and out of your home.

WARNING SIGNS TO WATCH OUT FOR

- Sudden changes in bank accounts or banking practices including unexplained withdrawals.
- 2. Abrupt changes in a will or other financial documents.

ICE CREAM IN A BAG

INGREDIENTS

1 cup half-and-half

2 tbsp granulated sugar

1/2 tsp vanilla extract

3 cups ice 3 cup salt Toppings of your choice

INSTRUCTIONS

In a small resealable plastic bag, combine half-and-half, sugar, and vanilla. Push out excess air and seal into a large resealable plastic bag, combine ice and salt. Place small bag inside larger bag and shake vigorously 7 to 10 minutes, until ice cream has hardened. Remove from bags and enjoy with or without some favorite toppings.

This also works using coffee cannisters, too, or even tightly-sealed plastic containers. Shake them or roll them back and forth for about the same amount of time. Then you have a handy container for the freezer for your leftovers (if you have any.)





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
