KLMHOA Meeting: 10-13-11

(President) Joe Beatty called the meeting to order at 7:00PM. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Beginning balance: \$484.47; Newsletter ads income: \$210.00;

Newsletter expense: (-\$150.00) Business entity* expense: (-\$20.00) BALANCE \$524.47

*In attempting to change the name of the HOA president on the bank account, it was learned that the KLMHOA Business Entity designation had expired with the State of California. The bank suspended the HOA bank account until paying the \$20 fee reinstated this designation.

HOUSEKEEPING CONCERNS:

Minutes from 9-15-11 meeting were read and approved. The secretary, Wendy Hunter, will ask the Newsletter editor, Joleen Gonser, to publish meeting minutes monthly, along with the next month's agenda so everyone in the park has the opportunity to read what is happening at KLMHOA meetings. (See page 9)

A KLMHOA Minutes Notebook has been added to the library that contains the minutes from previous meetings. A copy of the park's current rules will also be kept in this notebook, and a copy of the KLMHOA By-laws will be found or created and be kept in the notebook as well.

The secretary, Wendy Hunter, will ask the current managers if they have a copy of the KLMHOA By-laws. If not, she will check the GSMOL website to download a generic version for modification and/or approval at the next KLMHOA

Ellen moved that the attached modified rules of order be approved for use at these meetings. A copy of these rules will be

(1) kept in the Minutes Notebook and

(2) printed on the back of the meeting agenda for each meeting. COMMITTEE REPORT: Emergency Preparedness—Chair, Cheryl Clark.

Cheryl reported she would have a form for block captains at the next meeting. **OLD BUSINESS:**

Open Board Position: Bonnie Ellert nominated Jonathan Moreno for Vice President; Ellen Conrad seconded. He has been in the park for six months. Unanimous vote in favor.

Security concerns—President, Joe Beatty, spoke with the park managers and reported the following:

No solicitors are allowed in the park, so never let anyone into your home. Homeowners should not be fooled by someone calling or coming to the door claiming to be performing an inspection.

If there is a legitimate inspection in the park, managers will notify homeowners prior to the inspection.

The security guard's hours are 9:00 pm to 5:00 am. Cheryl Clark suggested that a reminder about these security concerns be included in the newsletter.

Bonnie Ellert asked to amend the suggestion from last month's meeting about notifying both the park managers and park owner when there is a concern. General discussion indicated members present thought it would be best to report to the managers first, give them an opportunity to manage the problem, and only report to the owner if there is no follow up or solution within a reasonable time period.

Field trips—Henry Vollenweider reported that he is trying to get discounts, free if possible. for seniors to go to local attractions like Sea World. Linda reported that anyone pushing someone in a wheelchair can get into Sea World for free, after the person in the wheelchair has paid for admission.

Shoppers for homebound residents-not discussed

Rummage sale: Park managers have agreed to advertise on Craig's List online, and pay for an ad in a local newspaper. There was brief discussion about various papers:

Pennysaver—some members thought few people read this

Tribune-no comments made

Military Press-some were unaware of this newspaper

Reader-some thought this was well read

Park does not want to charge homeowners to set up a table. Suggestion was made to charge \$2 that would go into the HOA account to provide activities or services for homeowners. Another suggestion was to set up an HOA table. Homeowners who don't want to sell anything themselves can donate items to this table and proceeds from these items would go into the HOA account. Members agreed that there was not enough time left this year to have a sale. And suggested that the next sale happen in the spring next year, maybe March. This will be put on the agenda for further discussion in January 2012. (CONTINUED ON PAGE 4)

Homeowner Newsletter ads-tabled in the absence of the editor, Joleen Gonser.

Pool concerns—President Joe Beatty spoke with the park managers and reported the following:

Temperature of the pool was raised to an average of 80° though there is no thermometer being left in the pool. Park managers indicated inadequate lighting and security to keep the pool open at night. A suggestion was made to continue to ask for extended hours if there are no legal reasons for lighting. No motion was made. Henry Vollenweider reported debris on the bottom of the pool, suggesting a need for better cleaning. No motion was made.

Parking concerns—President Joe Beatty spoke with the park managers and reported the following: (1) Nine (9) new parking spaces will be added to an empty home space in the park. (2) Park managers reported they will not enforce parking rules as long as there is an attempt to maintain street safety. However:

If you park overnight on a park street, you will be ticketed.

If you park more than 96 hours in a "public" space without moving your car, it will be considered "abandoned" and will be towed.

Guest spaces are considered "first come, first served" which means homeowners are allowed to use them. The secretary, Wendy Hunter, reminded members of Lucy Ritter's suggestions for everyone to be neighborly with regard to parking safely and courteously

Concerns about speeding were raised, and a suggestion was made to have the Newsletter editor publish speed reminders. (See PAGE 9) There was also a suggestion to post "Children at Play" signs, but no motions were made.

Renting rules—President Joe Beatty spoke with the park managers and reported the following: (1) Park rules allow home-owners to rent a room in their homes to others, but do not allow renting their entire home to others. (2) Park managers are following up with reports about homes that are renting to too many people. Cheryl Clark reported that federal rules allow up to two (2) people per bedroom plus two (2) people in a living room space. NEW BUSINESS:

Recreation room in the middle of park: Henry Vollenweider asked whether this could be opened during the day for homeowner use.

The room was apparently locked because of vandalism when it was left open.

Homeowners used to be provided a key but these keys no longer work.

Current use is possible if you pay a \$50 deposit at the office, which you get back after you leave the room in good condition.

Ellen Conrad volunteered to talk to the park managers to find out if there is a way to make use of this room more convenient for homeowners.

She will report results at next meeting.

Meeting refreshments—everyone seemed to agree that last month's refreshments were appreciated. Wendy Hunter moved that \$10 be provided to any volunteer willing to bring refreshments to future meetings. Unanimous vote in favor. Ellen Conrad volunteered to bring refreshments, and will submit receipts to the treasurer for reimbursement. Motion was made and seconded to end the meeting at 8 PM.



GPS - A POSSIBLE SCENARIO

"Your car is broken into while you are at a football game. The car is parked on the green adjacent to the football stadium, - especially allotted to football fans. Things stolen from the car include a garage door remote control, some money, and a GPS which was prominently mounted on the dashboard.

MOBILE PHONES

Lesson: DO NOT disclose the relationship between you and the people in your contact list.

CONFIRM A TEXT BY CALLING BACK

When a text is from a friend or family member to meet them somewhere, be sure to call back (not text) to confirm that the message came from them. If you cannot reach them, be very careful about going to places to meet 'family and friends' who text you.

DOGGIE BISCUIT DELUXE

2 cups whole wheat flour

1 tsp bone meal 1/4 cup cornmeal

2 tbsp corn oil or soy oil

1/2 cup soy flour 1/4 cup molasses

1/2 cup sunflower or pumpkin seeds

Garlic 1 tsp iodized salt

1 large egg mixed with 1/4 cup milk

Mix all dry ingredients in a large bowl. Add oil, molasses, garlic, and all but 1 tablespoon of the egg-milk mixture. Knead a few minutes to make a firm dough, adding more milk if needed. Let dough rest 1/2 hour or more. Roll out to 1/2 inch. Brush with remaining egg-milk mixture and cut with doggie biscuit shaped cookie cutter. Bake on greased cookie sheets at 350F 30-35 minutes. To make harder biscuits, turn off oven after baking, open door slightly and leave in the oven overnight.







the mixture thickens. Remove from the heat.
