

The KLCC had their annual elections on December 10th and we wanted to welcome all the new and previous residents of Kearney Lodge to The Connector and introduce our Board while spotlighting our exiting President, **Chuck Dombrow**.

Chuck Dombrow has lived at Kearney Lodge for almost 40 years and has been the President of the KLCC for the last 6. Ending his tenure with the board last Saturday, we wanted to reflect on who Chuck is to our community and his family. The eldest of 9 siblings, Chuck grew up in Detroit and joined the Navy at 18 where he spent 21 years on ships out of Guam, Yokosuka Japan, Alameda and San Diego and served 4 years during the Vietnam war. Chuck retired as a Chief Warrant Officer in 1979.



In 1990, Chuck was elected President of District 23 – attendance was at an all time high and he led the way with service to the community. Chuck received donations to feed 1,400 participants in the San Diego Special Olympics, an event held twice a year. Chuck held several other positions within the Moose Lodge and was elected Governor for the second time for the 1993-94 year. Following his stint as Governor, he took on the Lodge Administrator role until 2006 where he was nominated as Administrator of the Year 5 times during his term. Chuck also worked for 16 years as Operations Supervisor at General Dynamics, retiring in 1995.

Active in the California-Nevada Moose Association, he was elected Treasurer in 2004 and became the editor of the Associations Newsletter. In 2005, Chuck was elected Association Prelate and Vice President in 2006. On September 8, 2007, Chuck was elected Association President at the annual convention in Reno, Nevada.

Chuck has 3 children, 5 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren. Chuck and our current KLCC Treasurer, Valerie Dombrow have been married since 2003. After serving 6 years on the KLCC Board as President, Chuck has passed the gavel but will continue to be involved, helping to give sage advice and an unparalleled knowledge of leadership, stewardship and community service. We thank Chuck for all his years of service to our country and our community.

8 Fun New Year's Facts & Traditions

It's the New Year! A time when millions of people will celebrate with food, new resolutions or even a kiss as the clock strikes 12. But how much do you know about the holiday? Here are 10 fun facts about New Year's.

- 1. The first New Year's celebration dates back 4,000 years. Julius Caesar, the emperor of Rome, was the first to declare Jan. 1 a national holiday. He named the month after Janus, the Roman god of doors and gates. Janus had two faces, one looking forward and one looking back. Caesar felt that a month named after this god would be fitting.
- 2. 45% of Americans make New Year's resolutions. The top resolutions are: to lose weight, get organized, to spend less and save more, to stay fit and healthy, and to quit smoking. While nearly half of all Americans make resolutions, 25% of them give up on their resolutions by the second week of January.
- 3. Be sure to eat leafy greens on New Year's. Tradition says that the more leafy greens a person eats, the more prosperity he or she will experience (what an incentive for staying healthy!). Tradition also says that legumes bring prosperity because beans and peas look like coins. No wonder why so many people eat black eyed peas on Jan. 1.
- 4. Many people ring in New Year's by popping open a bottle of champagne. Americans drink close to 360 million glasses of sparkling wine during this time. The bubbly stuff dates back to the 17th century, when the cork was invented.
- 5. About 1 million people gather in New York City's Times Square to watch the ball drop. The Times Square New Year's Eve ball drop came about because of a ban on fireworks. The first ball in 1907 was 700 pounds and was lit with 100 25-watt lights. The current ball puts the old one to shame (thanks to technology). Today, it is covered in 2,688 crystals, is lit by 32,000 LED lights, weighs 11,875 pounds and is 12 feet in diameter.
- 6. Remember the last scene in When Harry Met Sally, when Harry references a song after he and Sally kiss? It was Auld Lang Syne, a song traditionally sung at the end of New Year's parties. Poet Robert Burns wrote it in 1788. Though most people do not know the words to Auld Lang Syne, the overall message is that people have to remember their loved ones, dead or alive, and keep them close in their hearts.
- 7. If Santa is the most common symbol associated with Christmas, then Baby New Year is the symbol most commonly associated with....you guessed it, New Year's! Baby New Year is often seen in a diaper, black top hat and a sash showing the numbers of the new year. Myth states that he matures into an old man during the year.
- 8. At the Mummers Parade in Philadelphia, 10,000 participants step through City Hall and perform in unique costumes. The parade dates back to mid-17th-century, incorporating elements from Irish, German, English, Swedish and other European heritages. The parade itself is divided into five divisions: a comic division, wench brigades, fancy division, string bands and fancy bridges. If you are in the area for New Year's, be sure to check out this event.




